Nick Krieger is author of the memoir *Nina Here Nor There: My Journey Beyond Gender*. A native of New York, Krieger realized at 21 that he'd been born on the wrong coast, prompting his transition to San Francisco.

Malinda Lo, a former entertainment reporter, is author of *Ash and Huntress*, two young adult fantasies. She lives in Northern California with her partner and their dog.

Michael McAllister has blogged at Dogpoet.com for ten years, and is founder of the Barbershop Reading Series.
